Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 701 amends the Uniform Credentialing Act to add definitions of "telehealth" and "telemonitoring." Allows a physician or physician assistant to establish a provider-patient relationship through telehealth. Allows a licensed physician or licensed physician assistant to prescribe drugs through telehealth if within the scope of practice. Mandates the Department to promulgate rules and regulations.

SECTION BY SECTION:

Section 1: Amends Section 38-101 to add sections to the Uniform Credentialing Act.

Section 2: Amends Section 38-105 to add definition sections to Uniform Credentialing Act.

Section 3: Defines "telehealth."

Section 4: Defines "telemonitoring."

Section 5: Amends Section 38-2001 to add sections to the Medicine and Surgery Practice Act.

Section 6: Allows a physician or physician assistant to establish a provider-patient relationship through telehealth.

Allows a licensed physician or licensed physician assistant to prescribe drugs through telehealth if within the scope of practice. Mandates the Department to promulgate rules and regulations.

Section 7: Repeals Sections 38-2001, 38-101 and 38-105.
