

AMENDMENTS TO LB863

Introduced by Banking, Commerce and Insurance.

1 1. Strike the original sections and insert the following new
2 sections:

3 Section 1. Sections 1 to 10 of this act shall be known and may be
4 cited as the Travel Insurance Act.

5 Sec. 2. (1) The purpose of the Travel Insurance Act is to promote
6 the public welfare by creating a comprehensive legal framework within
7 which travel insurance may be sold in this state.

8 (2) The requirements of the Travel Insurance Act shall apply to
9 travel insurance that covers any resident of this state or that is sold,
10 solicited, negotiated, or offered in this state and to policies and
11 certificates of travel insurance that are delivered or issued for
12 delivery in this state. The act shall not apply to cancellation fee
13 waivers or travel assistance services except as expressly provided in the
14 act.

15 (3) All other applicable provisions of the insurance laws of this
16 state shall continue to apply to travel insurance, except that the
17 specific provisions of the Travel Insurance Act shall supersede any
18 general provisions of law that would otherwise be applicable to travel
19 insurance.

20 Sec. 3. For purposes of the Travel Insurance Act, unless the
21 context otherwise requires:

22 (1) Aggregator site means a website that provides access to
23 information regarding insurance products from more than one insurer,
24 including product and insurer information, for use in comparison
25 shopping;

26 (2) Blanket travel insurance means a policy of travel insurance
27 issued to any eligible group providing coverage for specific classes of

1 persons defined in the policy with coverage provided to all members of
2 the eligible group without a separate charge to individual members of the
3 eligible group;

4 (3) Cancellation fee waiver means a contractual agreement between a
5 supplier of travel services and its customer to waive some or all of the
6 nonrefundable cancellation fee provisions of the supplier's underlying
7 travel contract with or without regard to the reason for the cancellation
8 or form of reimbursement. A cancellation fee waiver is not insurance;

9 (4) Department means the Department of Insurance;

10 (5) Director means the Director of Insurance;

11 (6) Eligible group means two or more persons who are engaged in a
12 common enterprise or have an economic, educational, or social affinity or
13 relationship, including, but not limited to:

14 (a)(i) Any entity engaged in the business of providing travel
15 services, including, but not limited to, a tour operator, a lodging
16 provider, a vacation property owner, a hotel, a resort, a travel club, a
17 travel agency, a property manager, a cultural exchange program, and a
18 common carrier, or (ii) the operator, owner, or lessor of a means of
19 transportation of passengers, including, but not limited to, any airline,
20 cruise line, railroad, steamship company, or public bus company, so long
21 as, within the particular mode of travel, all members or customers of the
22 group have a common exposure to risk attendant to such travel;

23 (b) Any college, school, or other institution of learning covering
24 students, teachers, employees, or volunteers;

25 (c) Any employer covering any group of employees, volunteers,
26 contractors, board of directors, dependents, or guests;

27 (d) Any sports team or camp, or any sponsor of a sports team or
28 camp, covering participants, members, campers, employees, officials,
29 supervisors, or volunteers;

30 (e) Any religious, charitable, recreational, educational, or civic
31 organization, or any branch thereof, covering any group of members,

1 participants, or volunteers;

2 (f) Any financial institution or financial institution vendor, or
3 parent holding company, trustee, or agent of or designated by one or more
4 financial institutions or financial institution vendors, including
5 account holders, credit card holders, debtors, guarantors, or purchasers;

6 (g) Any incorporated or unincorporated association, including a
7 labor union, having a common interest, constitution, and bylaws and
8 organized and maintained in good faith for purposes other than obtaining
9 insurance for members or participants of such association covering its
10 members;

11 (h) Any trust or the trustees of a fund established, created, or
12 maintained for the benefit of covering members, employees, or customers,
13 subject to the approval of the use of such trust by the director and the
14 requirements of the premium tax provisions in section 5 of this act, in
15 one or more associations described in subdivision (6)(g) of this section;

16 (i) Any entertainment production company covering any group of
17 participants, audience members, contestants, employees, or volunteers;

18 (j) Any volunteer fire department or ambulance, rescue, first-aid,
19 police, court, civil defense, or other similar volunteer group;

20 (k) Any preschool, daycare institution for children or adults, or
21 senior citizen club;

22 (l) Any automobile or truck rental or leasing company covering a
23 group of individuals who may become renters, lessees, or passengers
24 defined by their travel status on the rented or leased vehicles. The
25 common carrier, the operator, owner, or lessor of a means of
26 transportation, or the automobile or truck rental or leasing company is
27 the policyholder under a policy to which this subdivision applies; or

28 (m) Any other group if the director has determined that the members
29 are engaged in a common enterprise or have an economic, educational, or
30 social affinity or relationship and that issuance of the policy would not
31 be contrary to the public interest;

1 (7) Fulfillment materials means documentation sent to the purchaser
2 of a travel protection plan confirming the purchase and providing the
3 travel protection plan's coverage and assistance details;

4 (8) Group travel insurance means travel insurance issued to any
5 eligible group;

6 (9) Limited lines travel insurance producer means a:

7 (a) Licensed managing general agent or third-party administrator;

8 (b) Licensed insurance producer, including a limited lines insurance
9 producer; or

10 (c) Travel administrator;

11 (10) Offer and disseminate means providing general information,
12 including a description of the coverage and price, as well as processing
13 the application and collecting premiums;

14 (11) Primary certificate holder means an individual person who
15 elects and purchases travel insurance under a group travel insurance
16 policy;

17 (12) Primary policyholder means an individual person who elects and
18 purchases individual travel insurance;

19 (13) Travel administrator means a person who directly or indirectly
20 underwrites, collects charges, collateral, or premiums from, or adjusts
21 or settles claims on, residents of this state in connection with travel
22 insurance. A person shall not be considered a travel administrator if
23 such person's only actions that would otherwise cause such person to be
24 considered a travel administrator include:

25 (a) A person working for a travel administrator and such person's
26 activities are subject to the supervision and control of the travel
27 administrator;

28 (b) An insurance producer selling insurance or engaged in
29 administrative and claims-related activities within the scope of the
30 producer's license;

31 (c) A registered travel retailer offering and disseminating travel

1 insurance under the license of a limited lines travel insurance producer
2 in accordance with the Travel Insurance Act;

3 (d) A person adjusting or settling claims in the normal course of
4 that person's practice or employment as an attorney and such person does
5 not collect charges or premiums in connection with insurance coverage; or

6 (e) A business entity that is affiliated with a licensed insurer
7 while acting as a travel administrator for the direct and assumed
8 insurance business of an affiliated insurer;

9 (14) Travel assistance services means noninsurance services for
10 which the consumer is not indemnified based on a fortuitous event and if
11 providing the service does not result in transfer or shifting of risk
12 that would constitute the business of insurance. Travel assistance
13 services are not insurance and not related to insurance. Travel
14 assistance services includes, but is not limited to:

15 (a) Security advisories, destination information, and vaccination
16 and immunization information services;

17 (b) Travel reservation services;

18 (c) Entertainment, activity, and event planning;

19 (d) Translation assistance services;

20 (e) Emergency messaging services;

21 (f) International legal and medical referral services;

22 (g) Medical case monitoring services;

23 (h) Transportation arrangement and coordination services;

24 (i) Emergency cash transfer assistance services;

25 (j) Medical prescription replacement assistance services;

26 (k) Passport and travel document replacement assistance services;

27 (l) Lost luggage assistance services;

28 (m) Concierge services; and

29 (n) Any other service that is furnished in connection with planned
30 travel;

31 (15)(a) Travel insurance means insurance coverage for personal risks

1 incident to planned travel, including: Interruption or cancellation of a
2 trip or event; loss of baggage or personal effects; damages to
3 accommodations or rental vehicles; sickness, accident, disability, or
4 death occurring during travel; emergency evacuation; repatriation of
5 remains; or any other contractual obligations to indemnify or pay a
6 specified amount to the traveler upon determinable contingencies related
7 to travel as approved by the director.

8 (b) Travel insurance does not include a major medical plan that
9 provides comprehensive medical protection for travelers with trips
10 lasting longer than six months, including those working or residing
11 overseas as an expatriate, or any other product that requires a specific
12 insurance producer license;

13 (16) Travel protection plan means a plan that provides travel
14 insurance, travel assistance services, cancellation fee waivers, or any
15 combination thereof; and

16 (17) Travel retailer means a business entity that makes, arranges,
17 or offers planned travel and may offer and disseminate travel insurance
18 as a service to its customers on behalf of and under the direction of a
19 limited lines travel insurance producer.

20 Sec. 4. (1) No person may act as a limited lines travel insurance
21 producer or travel retailer unless such person holds the appropriate
22 license or registration as required by the Travel Insurance Act.

23 (2) The department may issue a limited lines travel insurance
24 producer license to an individual or business entity that files with the
25 department an application for a limited lines travel insurance producer
26 license in a form and manner prescribed by the department. A limited
27 lines travel insurance producer may sell, solicit, or negotiate travel
28 insurance through a licensed insurer.

29 (3) A travel retailer may offer and disseminate travel insurance
30 under a limited lines travel insurance producer only if the following
31 conditions are met:

1 (a) The limited lines travel insurance producer or travel retailer
2 provides to the purchaser of travel insurance:

3 (i) A description of the material terms or the actual material terms
4 of the travel insurance policy;

5 (ii) A description of the process for filing a claim;

6 (iii) A description of the review or cancellation process for the
7 travel insurance policy; and

8 (iv) The identity and contact information of the insurer and limited
9 lines travel insurance producer;

10 (b)(i) The limited lines travel insurance producer, at the time of
11 licensure, establishes and maintains a register on a form prescribed by
12 the department of each travel retailer that offers travel insurance on
13 behalf of such limited lines travel insurance producer. The register
14 shall include the name, address, and contact information of the travel
15 retailer and an officer or person who directs or controls the travel
16 retailer's operation and the travel retailer's federal tax identification
17 number. The limited lines travel insurance producer shall submit such
18 register to the department upon request; and

19 (ii) The limited lines travel insurance producer certifies that the
20 registered travel retailer complies with 18 U.S.C. 1033. The grounds for
21 suspension or revocation and the penalties applicable to resident
22 insurance producers under the Insurance Producers Licensing Act shall be
23 applicable to limited lines travel insurance producers and travel
24 retailers;

25 (c) The limited lines travel insurance producer designates one of
26 its employees who is a licensed individual producer as the designated
27 responsible producer responsible for the compliance with travel insurance
28 laws and rules and regulations applicable to such limited lines travel
29 insurance producers and travel retailers;

30 (d) The designated responsible producer, president, secretary,
31 treasurer, and any other officer or person who directs or controls the

1 limited lines travel insurance producer's insurance operations complies
2 with the fingerprinting requirements applicable to insurance producers in
3 the state where the limited lines travel insurance producer resides;

4 (e) The limited lines travel insurance producer has paid all
5 applicable licensing fees as set forth in section 44-4064 and any other
6 applicable state law; and

7 (f) The limited lines travel insurance producer requires each
8 employee and authorized representative of the travel retailer whose
9 duties include offering and disseminating travel insurance to receive a
10 program of instruction or training, which may be subject to review by the
11 director. The training material shall include, at a minimum, instructions
12 on the types of insurance offered, ethical sales practices, and required
13 disclosures to prospective customers.

14 (4) A limited lines travel insurance producer and travel retailers
15 registered under its license are exempt from the examination requirements
16 in section 44-4052 and the continuing education requirements in sections
17 44-3901 to 44-3908.

18 (5) The director may take disciplinary action against a limited
19 lines travel insurance producer pursuant to section 44-4059.

20 (6) Any travel retailer offering and disseminating travel insurance
21 shall make brochures or other written materials available to a
22 prospective purchaser that:

23 (a) Provide the identity and contact information of the insurer and
24 the limited lines travel insurance producer;

25 (b) Explain that the purchase of travel insurance is not required in
26 order to purchase any other product or service from the travel retailer;
27 and

28 (c) Explain that an unlicensed travel retailer is permitted to
29 provide general information about the insurance offered by the travel
30 retailer, including a description of the coverage and price, but is not
31 qualified or authorized to answer technical questions about the terms and

1 conditions of the travel insurance offered by the travel retailer or to
2 evaluate the adequacy of the customer's existing insurance coverage.

3 (7) A travel retailer's employee or authorized representative who is
4 not licensed as an insurance producer shall not:

5 (a) Evaluate or interpret the technical terms, benefits, or
6 conditions of the offered travel insurance coverage;

7 (b) Evaluate or provide advice concerning a prospective purchaser's
8 existing insurance coverage; or

9 (c) Hold such travel retailer employee or authorized representative
10 out as a licensed insurer, licensed producer, or insurance expert.

11 (8) A travel retailer whose insurance-related activities, and those
12 of its employees and authorized representatives, are limited to offering
13 and disseminating travel insurance on behalf of and under the direction
14 of a limited lines travel insurance producer meeting the conditions
15 stated in this section is authorized to receive related compensation for
16 the services upon registration by the limited lines travel insurance
17 producer.

18 (9) The limited lines travel insurance producer is responsible for
19 the acts of the travel retailer and shall use reasonable means to ensure
20 that the travel retailer complies with the Travel Insurance Act.

21 (10) Any person licensed in a major line of authority as an
22 insurance producer is authorized to sell, solicit, and negotiate travel
23 insurance. A property and casualty insurance producer is not required to
24 become appointed by an insurer in order to sell, solicit, or negotiate
25 travel insurance.

26 Sec. 5. (1) A travel insurer shall pay premium tax, as provided in
27 Chapter 77, article 9, on travel insurance premiums paid by:

28 (a) An individual primary policyholder who is a resident of this
29 state;

30 (b) A primary certificate holder who is a resident of this state and
31 elects coverage under a group travel insurance policy; or

1 (c) A blanket travel insurance policyholder that is a resident in or
2 has its principal place of business or the principal place of business of
3 an affiliate or subsidiary that has purchased blanket travel insurance in
4 this state for eligible blanket group members, subject to any
5 apportionment rules which apply to the insurer across multiple taxing
6 jurisdictions or that permit the insurer to allocate premium on an
7 apportioned basis in a reasonable and equitable manner in those
8 jurisdictions.

9 (2) A travel insurer shall:

10 (a) Document the state of residence or principal place of business
11 of the policyholder or certificate holder; and

12 (b) Report as premium only the amount allocable to travel insurance
13 only and not any amounts received for travel assistance services or
14 cancellation fee waivers.

15 Sec. 6. Travel protection plans may be offered for one price for
16 the combined features that the travel protection plan offers in this
17 state if:

18 (1) Such plans clearly disclose to the consumer, at or prior to the
19 time of purchase, that the plans include travel insurance, travel
20 assistance services, and cancellation fee waivers as applicable, and the
21 person provides information and an opportunity, at or prior to the time
22 of purchase, for the consumer to obtain additional information regarding
23 the features and pricing of each; and

24 (2) The fulfillment materials:

25 (a) Describe and delineate the travel insurance, travel assistance
26 services, and cancellation fee waivers in the travel protection plans;
27 and

28 (b) Include the travel insurance disclosures and contact information
29 for persons providing the travel assistance services and cancellation fee
30 waivers, as applicable.

31 Sec. 7. (1) All persons offering travel insurance to residents of

1 this state are subject to the Unfair Insurance Trade Practices Act except
2 as otherwise provided in this section. In the event of a conflict between
3 the Travel Insurance Act and other provisions of the insurance laws of
4 this state regarding the sale and marketing of travel insurance and
5 travel protection plans, the provisions of the Travel Insurance Act shall
6 control.

7 (2) Offering or selling a travel insurance policy that could never
8 result in payment of any claims for any insured under the policy is an
9 unfair trade practice.

10 (3)(a) All documents provided to consumers prior to the purchase of
11 travel insurance, including, but not limited to, sales materials,
12 advertising materials, and marketing materials, shall be consistent with
13 the terms of the travel policy, including, but not limited to, forms,
14 endorsements, policies, rate filings, and certificates of insurance.

15 (b) For travel insurance policies or certificates that contain
16 preexisting condition exclusions, information and an opportunity to learn
17 more about the preexisting condition exclusions shall be provided to
18 consumers any time prior to the time of purchase of such travel insurance
19 and in the fulfillment materials provided.

20 (c)(i) Fulfillment materials and the information described in
21 subdivision (3)(a) of section 4 of this act shall be provided to a
22 policyholder or certificate holder as soon as practicable following the
23 purchase of a travel protection plan. Unless the insured has either
24 started a covered trip or filed a claim under the travel insurance
25 policy, a policyholder or certificate holder may cancel a policy or
26 certificate for a full refund of the travel protection plan price from
27 the date of purchase of a travel protection plan until at least:

28 (A) Fifteen days following the date of delivery of the travel
29 protection plan fulfillment materials by postal mail; or

30 (B) Ten days following the date of delivery of the travel protection
31 plan fulfillment materials by means other than postal mail.

1 (ii) For purposes of this subdivision, delivery means handing
2 fulfillment materials to the policyholder or certificate holder or
3 sending fulfillment materials by postal mail or electronic means to the
4 policyholder or certificate holder.

5 (d) The travel insurance policy documentation and fulfillment
6 materials shall disclose whether the travel insurance is primary or
7 secondary to other applicable coverage.

8 (e) If travel insurance is marketed directly to a consumer through
9 an insurer's website or through an aggregator site, it shall not be an
10 unfair trade practice or other violation of law where an accurate summary
11 or short description of the coverage is provided on the web page, so long
12 as the consumer has access to the full provisions of the policy through
13 electronic means.

14 (4) No person offering, soliciting, or negotiating travel insurance
15 or travel protection plans on an individual or group basis may do so by
16 using a negative option or opt out, which requires a consumer to take an
17 affirmative action to deselect coverage, such as unchecking a box on an
18 electronic form, when the consumer purchases a trip.

19 (5) It shall be an unfair trade practice to market blanket travel
20 insurance coverage as free.

21 (6) When a consumer's destination jurisdiction requires insurance
22 coverage, it shall not be an unfair trade practice to require that a
23 consumer choose between the following options as a condition of
24 purchasing a trip or travel package:

25 (a) Purchasing the insurance coverage required by the destination
26 jurisdiction through the travel retailer or limited lines travel
27 insurance producer supplying the trip or travel package; or

28 (b) Agreeing to obtain and provide proof of insurance coverage that
29 meets the destination jurisdiction's requirements prior to departure.

30 Sec. 8. (1) No person shall act as or represent that such person is
31 a travel administrator for travel insurance in this state unless such

1 person:

2 (a) Is a licensed property and casualty insurance producer in this
3 state for activities permitted under such producer license;

4 (b) Holds a valid managing general agent license in this state; or

5 (c) Holds a valid third-party administrator license in this state.

6 (2) A travel administrator and such travel administrator's employees
7 are exempt from the licensing requirements of adjusters for travel
8 insurance such administrator and its employees administer.

9 (3) An insurer is responsible for the acts of a travel administrator
10 administering travel insurance underwritten by the insurer and is
11 responsible for ensuring that the travel administrator maintains all
12 books and records relevant to the insurer to be made available by the
13 travel administrator to the department upon request.

14 Sec. 9. (1) Travel insurance shall be classified and filed for
15 purposes of rates and forms under an inland marine line of insurance,
16 however, travel insurance that provides coverage for sickness, accident,
17 disability, or death occurring during travel, either exclusively, or in
18 conjunction with related coverages of emergency evacuation, repatriation
19 of remains, or incidental limited property and casualty benefits such as
20 baggage or trip cancellation, may be filed under either an accident and
21 health line of insurance or an inland marine line of insurance.

22 (2) Travel insurance may be in the form of an individual, group, or
23 blanket policy.

24 (3) Eligibility and underwriting standards for travel insurance may
25 be developed and provided based on travel protection plans designed for
26 individual or identified marketing or distribution channels, so long as
27 those standards also meet this state's underwriting standards for inland
28 marine lines of insurance.

29 Sec. 10. The department may adopt and promulgate rules and
30 regulations to carry out the Travel Insurance Act.

31 Sec. 11. Sections 11 to 17 of this act shall be known and may be

1 cited as the Primary Care Investment Act.

2 Sec. 12. On December 27, 2020, the federal Consolidated
3 Appropriations Act, 2021, Public Law 116-260, became law. It requires
4 group health plans, health insurance issuers, and health insurance plans
5 to provide data to the federal government on the total amount of spending
6 on hospital costs; health care provider and clinical service costs, for
7 primary care and specialty care separately; costs for prescription drugs;
8 and other medical costs, including wellness services. Primary care is
9 important to the health of individuals and has been associated with
10 better health outcomes at lower costs. The purpose of the Primary Care
11 Investment Council is to analyze the data collected by the federal
12 government in accordance with the federal Consolidated Appropriations
13 Act, 2021, and other data sources, to assist the Legislature in
14 understanding:

15 (1) The current amount of health care spending on primary care in
16 Nebraska from public and private sources;

17 (2) Barriers to residents of Nebraska accessing primary care;

18 (3) Barriers to health payors and medical providers in investing in
19 primary care;

20 (4) Alternative payment models that deliver high-quality care and
21 spend health care dollars more wisely;

22 (5) The public health benefits for Nebraska residents if the level
23 of primary care investment in Nebraska increased;

24 (6) The estimated cost savings for health care consumers as well as
25 public and private payors if the level of primary care investment
26 increased in Nebraska;

27 (7) Nebraska's investment in primary care services relative to other
28 states; and

29 (8) Health outcomes in Nebraska relative to other states.

30 Sec. 13. For purposes of the Primary Care Investment Act:

31 (1) Department means the Department of Insurance; and

1 (2) Primary care physician means a physician licensed under the
2 Uniform Credentialing Act and practicing in the area of family medicine,
3 pediatrics, internal medicine, geriatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, or
4 general medicine.

5 Sec. 14. (1) The Primary Care Investment Council is created. The
6 council shall consist of fifteen voting members and two ex officio,
7 nonvoting members.

8 (2) The Primary Care Investment Council shall consist of the
9 following voting members:

10 (a) Three representatives of primary care physicians, one
11 representing each congressional district;

12 (b) A representative of behavioral health providers;

13 (c) A representative of hospitals;

14 (d) A representative of academia with experience in health care
15 data;

16 (e) Two other representatives of health providers who are not
17 primary care physicians or hospitals;

18 (f) Three representatives of health insurers, one of which shall be
19 a representative of a managed care organization;

20 (g) One representative of large employers that purchase health
21 insurance for employees, which representative is not an insurer;

22 (h) One representative of small employers that purchase group health
23 insurance for employees, which representative is not an insurer;

24 (i) One health care consumer advocate who is knowledgeable about the
25 private health insurance market; and

26 (j) A representative of organizations that facilitate health
27 information exchange in Nebraska.

28 (3) The following officials or their designees shall serve as ex
29 officio, nonvoting members:

30 (a) The Director of Insurance; and

31 (b) The Director of Medicaid and Long-Term Care of the Division of

1 Medicaid and Long-Term Care of the Department of Health and Human
2 Services.

3 (4) The Governor shall appoint the voting members of the council.
4 The Governor shall appoint the initial members by October 1, 2022. Any
5 member who ceases to meet the requirements for his or her appointment
6 regarding representation or practice shall cease to be a member of the
7 council. Any vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original
8 appointment.

9 (5) The council shall select one of its members to serve as
10 chairperson for a one-year term. The council shall conduct its
11 organizational meeting in October 2022.

12 (6) The council shall terminate on July 1, 2029.

13 Sec. 15. The Primary Care Investment Council shall:

14 (1) Develop an appropriate definition for primary care investment;

15 (2) Measure the current level of primary care investment, measured
16 as a part of overall health care spending, by public and private payors
17 in Nebraska;

18 (3) Conduct a comparison of spending on primary care services and
19 health outcomes in Nebraska with surrounding states and nationally;

20 (4) Develop an appropriate target level of primary care investment
21 by public and private payors in Nebraska;

22 (5) Recommend strategies to achieve the target level of primary care
23 investment through alternative payment models;

24 (6) Identify the public health benefits and estimated cost savings
25 that would result from meeting the target level of primary care
26 investment through alternative payment models; and

27 (7) Identify solutions to barriers for Nebraska residents from
28 accessing primary care and for health payors and medical providers from
29 investing in primary care.

30 Sec. 16. The Primary Care Investment Council shall convene at least
31 once a year through 2028 to review the state's progress in meeting the

1 target level of primary care investment, update the data regarding public
2 health benefits and cost savings as a result of investments in primary
3 care, update the strategies to achieve the target level of primary care
4 investment, and consider other information as necessary.

5 Sec. 17. On or before November 1, 2023, and on or before each
6 November 1 until November 1, 2028, the Primary Care Investment Council
7 shall prepare and the department shall electronically submit a report to
8 the Executive Board of the Legislative Council and the Governor which
9 contains, at a minimum, the Primary Care Investment Council's findings
