Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 121 relates to eligibility for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program [SNAP]. It would eliminate a lifetime ban on SNAP for drug felons if certain requirements are met.

LB 121 strikes the language in section [4][b] that makes any person with three or more convictions for use or possession and persons convicted of distribution or the intent to sell or distribute a controlled substance ineligible for SNAP. [Sec. 1, page 5, lines 5-17.] Those persons would now become eligible for SNAP, subject to other provisions in subsection [4].

The remainder of subsection [4] is amended to limit SNAP participation for drug felons. Under the new language inserted into section [4][b], a person convicted of a felony involving the possession, use, or distribution of a controlled substance would only qualify for SNAP if they have completed their sentence for the felony or are serving a term of parole, probation, or post-release supervision for such felony.
